Obviously there will be boys who, through no fault of their own, will be unable to command a place in a team and it is possible that we may be able to organise a 'mixed age' team. However, this can only be done with parent support, and we would be delighted to hear from any parents who would be prepared to manage such a side.

You will notice throughout the magazine names of traders who have so generously sponsored us by giving cash support and getting the club off to a flying start. It would be a nice gesture if, in response to them helping us to provide facilities for your children, you in turn can support them in the services they provide. We thank them very much.

May I, as Chairman, once again assure you all that the aim of the club is to arrange for ALL its members and supporters facilities to enjoy their activities and generate good will at both sporting and community levels. **David Gurney**


Winning is a bonus
